2021 Writing Prize for New Student Scholarship in Reproductive Rights & Justice

CALL FOR SUBMISSIONS - WIN MONEY AND GET PUBLISHED!

If/When/How: Lawyering for Reproductive Justice, the <u>Center for Reproductive Rights</u>, and the <u>Center on Reproductive Rights and Justice</u> invite submissions for the 16th annual Writing Prize for New Student Scholarship in Reproductive Rights & Justice.

PRIZES

Winning authors will receive cash prizes: \$750 (1st place), \$500 (2nd place), or \$250 (3rd place), and a copy of the textbook, <u>Cases on Reproductive Rights and Justice</u> (Murray & Luker). The first-place winning submission will also be granted a "presumption of publishability" and receive expedited review by the <u>Berkeley Journal of Gender, Law & Justice</u>.

SCOPE

The Writing Prize seeks student scholarship exploring reproductive rights and justice issues in the U.S. We encourage writing that amplifies lesser-heard voices, suggests innovative solutions, and takes into account the realities and the lived experiences of the people most affected by reproductive oppression. We ask students to think expansively about reproductive rights and justice and to analyze issues using an intersectional lens – to consider the impact of demographic and institutional factors such as race, ethnicity, class, gender, sexuality, ability, and immigration status.

THEME

The suggested theme for this year is "Supporting Reproductive Health, Rights, and Justice Beyond Roe v. Wade." Submissions might explore topics that intersect with If/When/How's strategic initiatives, such as removing barriers to access and supporting those who seek reproductive care outside the clinical setting, combatting criminalization, strategies for securing reproductive rights at the state or local level, and public funding of reproductive health care through an intersectional, reproductive justice lens. All submissions on other reproductive rights and justice topics are welcomed.

REQUIREMENTS

Papers must be at least 15 pages in length (not including footnotes), double-spaced in 12-point font with footnotes in 10-point font, conforming to Bluebook citation format. Only original scholarship by current J.D. or LL.M. law students or recent 2020 graduates will be accepted. Papers being considered for publication elsewhere are ineligible for the first-place prize but may be considered for second and third place. Winners will be selected by a panel of legal academics and announced in December 2021.
